Pastor Ali's Note

Now, get on your way quickly and tell his disciples, 'He is risen from the dead. He is going on ahead of you to Galilee. You will see him there.' That's the message." Meanwhile, the eleven disciples were on their way to Galilee, headed for the mountain Jesus had set for their reunion. The moment they saw him they worshiped him...Jesus...gave his charge: 'God authorized and commanded me to commission you: Go out and train everyone you meet, far and near, in this way of life, marking them by baptism in the threefold name: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Then instruct them in the practice of all I have commanded you. I'll be with you as you do this, day after day after day, right up to the end of the age'." Matt 28:5-7,16-20

Jesus is Risen! Death has lost it's sting! Victory has been won for us! Amen! That is not the end of the story though, Matthew shares the next part of our journey in the words above –the Great Commission – to go and make disciples in the name of Jesus Christ our Lord!

Easter in many ways can be the beginning of our story as Christians – without Easter we would have no hope,

But how do we do it – we do it by building relationships, Christian relationships with others! We do it through working with our youth, helping the troubled in the community, offering Messy Church/Community Café/Family Night Out/Easter Egg Hunt experiences, praying, walking a journey with another, befriending someone, sharing a gift/ talent you have with others, reaching out to another and showing them you care for them! We give ourselves in the name of Jesus Christ our Lord and Savior!

Have you ever thought of some so crazy as talking about your faith in a dog park, at a nail salon, at a coffee house, to a group of fishermen, etc. Other than the fishermen, these all have been places that have started reaching new people for God through ministry at these locations. They even have Taco Tues at the local Taco shop in Florida where these ideas originated and are still going strong today. Laity took to these places their stories and invited friends and friends of friends to come and hear a devotion (many times personal) and discuss it together. And just like when Jesus spoke to the crowds, some left, some stayed through intrigue, and others wanted to learn more. And this is how we start the journey of making new disciples for Jesus

Christ. Where would you like to start a new ministry? Share it with your pastors and others! Lord, when we do not know how to reach out and touch the lives of others, show us a way, when we feel we have nothing to share, remind us how we became the person we are today, when we whine because we want our way, show us that your way is the best. Thank you for what you have done for us and continue to walk with us each step of the journey we are on as your disciples. Amen.

From Pastor Wade's Desk

Siblings in Christ!

Time! Do you think much about time? I want to share with you just a couple of quotes regarding time! I hope that will be okay.

Unfortunately, the clock is ticking, the hours are going by. The past increases, the future recedes. Possibilities decreasing, regrets mounting – Haruki Murakami. Haruki Murakami is a Japanese author, and his view of time might be compared to a ball of string; the more you use it the less there is

The future is something which everyone reaches at the rate of sixty minutes an hour, whatever he does, whoever he is - C.S. Lewis. Leave it to C.S. Lewis to ground us in reality!

Whatever your view of time, for Ali and me it is hard to believe that we have almost finished our third year with you! We both hope for many more to come!

Think about what these three years have meant to us. We arrived near the end of a world-wide pandemic. Never before in our history have we seen such times. Together, we had to start looking at the world as a different place and a different era of our time. Together, we had to begin thinking about our churches and our future. When we arrived here in 2021, we also had a new name as four churches that included a word we never used before, our charge became a parish as we began to adopt the name West County United Methodist Parish!

In 2022, we began to look at what this new name might mean to us. The short answer is this—four United Methodist Churches living into the connectional system that I believe John Wesley imagined nearly 200 years ago. We are not closing churches. We are not minimizing churches. We are doing the opposite—we are empowering each of our churches to become the best that they can be! We are offering hope in our future together. Ali and I are hopeful that as we work together, our individual churches will become stronger.

In 2023, at our Annual Church Conference, we adopted a strategic plan that some have labeled as simplistic and some have called relevant. Both words are very descriptive of the plan. Never before have we ever thought of a future together as four churches! Our plan had to begin with small steps hoping to take bigger steps in the future.

So far this year, each of the church councils have begun to read through and discussing a book entitled An Effective Approach to Cooperative Parishes by Kay Kotan and Jason Stanley. We have talked about what Radical Hospitality might look like in our churches and we received some relevant feedback in our small group time.

There is a small group of members of each church that worked through a learning experience called The Empowerment Group. They are in the process of a project to hold one event each month just to make sure we know each other!

We have two more things to share. Make certain you continue reading on the reverse side of this letter!!

In a few weeks, each of you will be receiving a letter from the Parish asking for current contact information. It is not that we don't know who you are or where you live, we just want to make sure!! As we update each of the membership lists in each or our churches, we hope to create a Parish-wide directory. Additionally, we are hopeful to create a one-call system to be able to connect with everyone at one time. Please take the time to make sure we have your current contact information!!

Lastly, I am proud to preview for you a logo and letterhead that unites and identifies our Parish. I ask you to begin to think like this—we are ONE church in FOUR locations. While each church may continue to have their own logo, our Parish is now united by theses symbols!





The smaller of the two will be used for letterhead and the bigger, circular logo will be used wherever a larger logo is appropriate!

Changes in notifying the pastor from the hospital! When you go into the hospital you may be asked if you are a member of a certain church, etc. and asked if you would like your pastor notified. If you respond "yes", that does not mean the pastor will be notified, just that you are okay for it to happen. The system runs on volunteers checking that information and calling the pastors. Unfortunately, there are a limited number of volunteers and most often a pastor is not notified from the hospital when a parishioner is in the hospital (or may be discharged before the call is made).



Buying on a budget

- Homemade soup is a healthy and tasty way to use vegetables. Make a big batch and freeze leftovers in small lunch-size containers.
- WIC (Women, Infants, and Children) and Senior Farmers Market coupons can be used by WIC participants and older adults to purchase locally- grown, delicious fruits and vegetables.
- When trying new fruits and vegetables, buy in small amounts. Taste test before you change your grocery list.
- Keep it simple. Buy dried beans, peas, and lentils in their raw or uncooked form instead of the processed and packaged versions which cost more.
- Avoid buying single servings. Purchasing many small packages of produce is often more expensive than buying in larger amounts.
- Shop at discount grocery stores for good deals on fruits and vegetables, especially canned items.
- Shop at large grocery stores instead of small convenience stores when possible. There is more choice and the produce is often less expensive at larger stores.

- To make many fresh fruits and vegetables last longer, store them in the refrigerator or freezer soon after getting home from your shopping trip. Many cookbooks offer specific freezing instructions.
- Clearly label your foods in the freezer and refrigerator with the contents and date to stay within a safe time frame.
- Get creative with your leftover fruits and vegetables. Make salsa from your tomatoes and smoothies from your fruits! Visit www. fruitsandveggiesmatter.gov to learn how.
- Look for sales and deals on fruits & vegetables at the grocery store or through coupons.
- Cut your fruits and vegetables at home. Pre-cut produce can cost much more than whole fruits and vegetables.
- Don't shop hungry. Eat a healthy snack, such as an apple, before going to the grocery store so that you stick to your budget and avoid spending money set aside for fruit and vegetables on less healthy temptations.
- Maximize your time and money. Cut coupons for foods, such as fruits and vegetables, only on your grocery list.
- Canned fruits and vegetables will last a long time and can be a healthy addition to a variety of meals. Choose canned vegetables that have no added salt and fruit that is canned in 100% fruit juice.
- Frozen fruit and vegetables store well in the freezer until you're ready to add them to a meal.
- Pick your own at local farms. Late summer and early fall is a great time to pick your own fruits and vegetables. This can be a fun and less expensive way to buy in bulk and freeze, can, or dry for later.
- Dried fruit lasts for a long time, but can be expensive.
- Buy in bulk with friends and share the cost.
- Store-brands can be a great budget choice for many forms of fruits and vegetables.
- Buy frozen fruits and vegetables in large bags to stretch your budget (e.g., green beans and blueberries). Avoid those with added sugar, salt, or sauce.

CLEANING BUCKET CHALLENGE This fall, our annual conference's Mission Barn made a plea for cleaning buckets. Multiple natural disasters across our nation and our world have significantly impacted the supply of buckets. The Mission Barn is currently collecting this important and tangible expression of God's love. In response to this need, the Erie-Meadville District is sponsoring a friendly cleaning bucket competition among the district churches. Congregations are being challenged to purchase the components and assemble the buckets for shipment to the Mission Barn. The contest will end on Easter Sunday (March 31, 2024). Participating congregations are asked to record the number of assembled buckets and provide a digital picture of their collection as part of a District Conference celebration in April.

If you wish to purchase any items used in a flood bucket, Fairview is collecting these items. They have to be these exact items for them to fit in the bucket properly. We can collect at each church and then redistribute to Fairview in the end.

Cleaning Kit Materials

One five-gallon round bucket with re-sealable lid (14.35" h x 12.19" w x 12.19" d)

No screw lids

May be used, but must be free from all residual product

Advertisements on the outside acceptable

One 32-64 oz. bottle liquid laundry detergent

One 16-40 oz. bottle liquid concentrate household cleaner

No spray cleaners

One 16-34 oz. bottle dish soap

One 4-8 oz. pump spray air freshener (liquid, not gel)

One 6-14 oz. pump spray insect repellent (pack of 10-20 wipes also acceptable)

Pump spray bottles must have protective covers

One scrub brush

With or without handle

18 re-useable cleaning wipes

No terrycloth, microfiber or paper towels

Remove from packaging

Five scouring pads

No stainless-steel pads with soap in them Remove from packaging

36-50 clothespins

One 50-100 ft. clothesline (cotton or plastic line)

24 roll of heavy-duty trash bags (33-45-gallon sizes)

Remove from packaging

Five N95 particulate respirator dust masks (1-3 mm thickness)

No surgical masks

Two pairs kitchen gloves

Durable for multiple uses

Remove from packaging

One pair work gloves

Cotton with leather palm or all leather

Our shoe boxes this year went to four different countries: Haiti, Columbia, Peru, and a Hard-to-reach area. The shoe boxes are sent to different locations so the children don't all receive the same items in their boxes. Here is some information on where our shoe boxes went:



Haiti

Haiti is located in the Caribbean Sea on the western part of Hispaniola, the island it shares with the Dominican Republic. This historically poor nation has suffered much from disasters including a major earthquake that struck near its capital Port-au-Prince in 2010. Samaritan's Purse began delivering Operation Christmas Child shoebox gifts to children here in 1996.

Colombia

Colombia is the only country in South America to border both the Atlantic and the Pacific Oceans. Its geography ranges from snowcapped volcanoes in the Andes Mountains to beautiful beaches on the coast. Samaritan's Purse started delivering Operation Christmas Child shoe box gifts to children here in 2003, and we launched The Greatest Journey, our follow-up discipleship program for shoe box recipients, in Colombia in 2009.
